

FAIRFORD TOWN WALK

DISTANCE AROUND 2 MILES

An easy walk (keeping on hard standing) around the Town capturing some of the best bits of Fairford and avoiding muddy fields and stiles.

DIRECTIONS:

From the car park, turn right into Mill Lane. You will get a lovely view of St Mary's Church (1), walk by the Mill (2), over the bridge (3), past the Oxpens (4) and head on the footpath towards Coronation Street. At the T-junction, turn left into Coronation Street. At the end of the road, turn left onto Milton Street at the Green (6). Cross the main road with care. Walk past the former Coln House School (on your right) and past Fairford United Church, before turning right into Waterloo Lane.

Waterloo Lane narrows into a footpath by Waterloo Cottage, a former iron foundry (8) then opens out with Dilly's Bridge (9) on your left. Walk across Dilly's Bridge and turn left. Follow the path which opens up into Gas Lane with Retort House (11), site of the former gas works on your right. Gas Lane leads to Back Lane.

Turn right along Back Lane and follow it along until you see an alleyway on your left and pedestrian access onto Wesson Place on your right. Turn right into Courtbrook past Wesson Place. Turn left and walk the length of Courtbrook. At the end of the road, cross over and walk along the alley marked Brook Vale into Moor Lane. Follow Moor Lane around the bend to the left. At the end of Moor Lane, you find a narrow path past the sign for Moor Lane Court, and a narrow path that leads back onto the A417 (London Road).

Carefully cross the A417 and turn right for 50 yards, passing Keble House (12). Just after Keble House, turn left and take the alleyway to The Croft. Turn left, keeping the tennis courts on your right, and follow the road past Fairford Hospital and onward through Croft Lane archway (13). This brings you into the High Street with the Market Square with its range of shops, pubs, restaurants and cafes (14). Turn right and wander past the Old Police Station (16) on your right and the former school, now Fairford Community Centre (15) on your left. You will then see St Mary's Church (1) on your left and find yourself back at the car park.



Fairford is an excellent base for starting out on many beautiful riverside and lake walks, some of which lead out to the Cotswold Water Park. Whether you want to meander through our water meadows or stroll through our history, we have a walk for you.

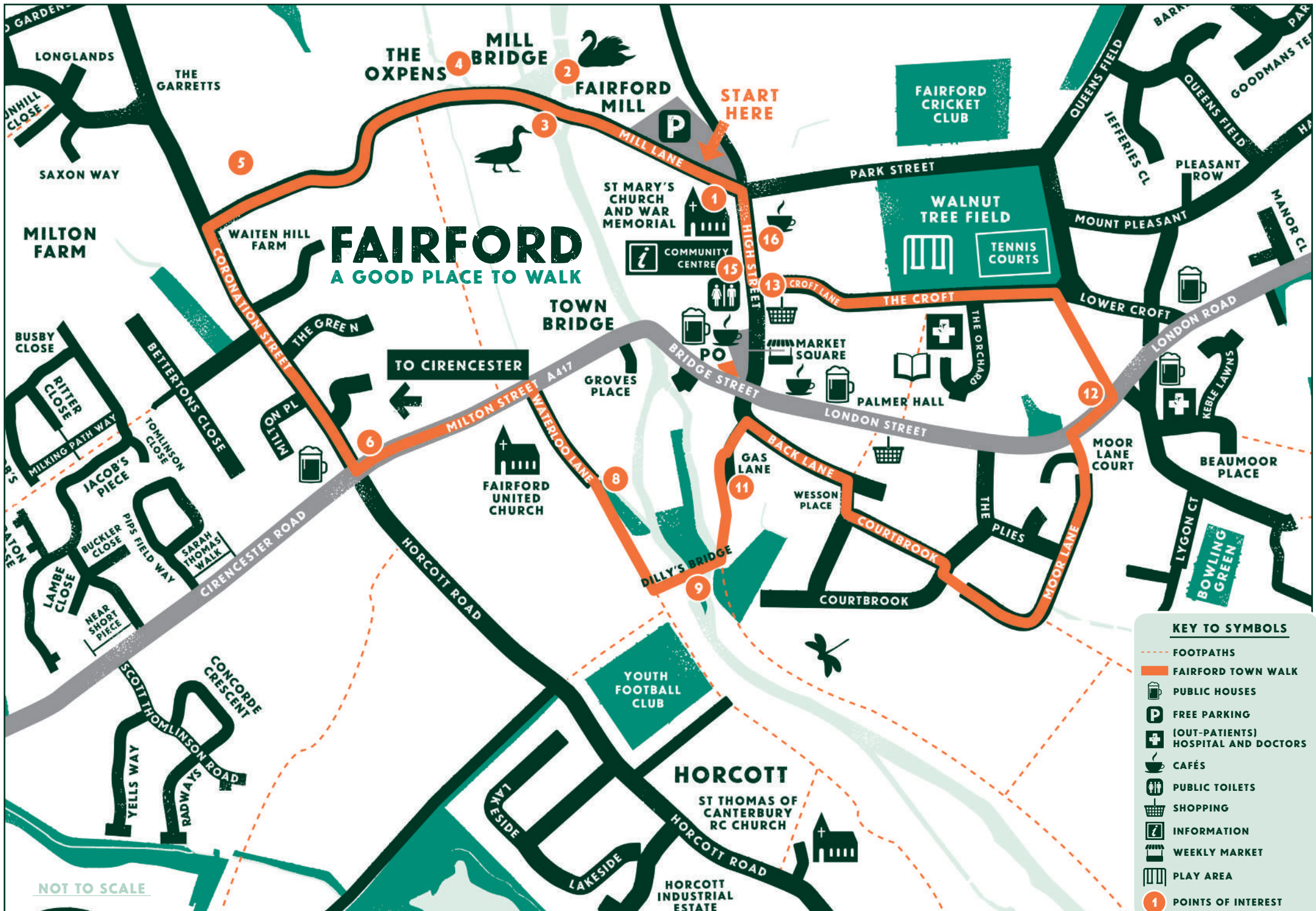
